

EMA ELECTION 2023-2024

NOTICE UNDER RULE 25 (C) INVITING NOMINATION FORMS FOR ELECTION OF THE PRESIDENT AND TWELVE MEMBERS OF THE MANAGING COMMITTEE FOR THE YEAR 2023-2024

This is to hereby inform to all the members, that the Nomination form for the post of **President** and **12 Members** of Managing Committee will be issued from **Tuesday 1st June 2023**. Members please take note that only local members would be eligible, to contest election. Election shall be held only in the event of the Association receiving more valid nomination forms than are required. Such nomination form will be issued from **1st June 2023**.

ELIGIBILITY:

The Proprietor/Partner / Director / Manager or the Principal Officer of the Member - Firm, whose name appears as an authorised nominee in the Register of Members of The Association, as on **31st March**, **2023** is eligible to contest the above election [Rule 25 (b)]. A Member contesting for the president is **NOT** entitled to contest for the Membership of the Managing Committee.

NOMINATION FORMS:

The Authorised Nominee of the Member-firms who wish to contest the election are requested to obtain a prescribed nomination form from the EMA's Office, available from **Tuesday**, **1st June**, **2023** during office hours, against a written request on the firm's letter head, indicating clearly if they wish to contest for the post of the President or the Membership of the Managing Committee. These nomination forms duly completed in all respect and signed by the intending contestant, proposer and two seconders, must be deposited in the box provided at the EMA's office from **1st June 2023 to 7th June 2023**, The nomination forms must be deposited on or before **5.00 pm.** on last date i.e. **Wednesday**, **7th June 2023** after which the box will be sealed by the **Commissioner**. (LATE ENTRIES WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED).

Please note that the contestant, the proposer and the two seconders must be the authorised nominees of the Member-firms, whose names are listed in the register of Members maintained in the EMA's Office. Further, necessary rubber stamps must be affixed for signature and addresses of the contestant / proposer/seconders. In their own interest, the contestants are requested to carefully read and follow the instructions printed in the Nomination Forms before completing/depositing it in the box.

WITHDRAWALS:

If any of the contesting candidate wishes to withdraw from the Election, he/she shall inform the Hon. Secretary of the association in writing on or before **12th June 2023** to facilitate the intending contestant, nomination cards of the authorised nominee of the Member Firms are available for inspection up to **31st May 2023**; in the EMA's Office upto **5.00 pm**.

RULES

MANAGING COMMITTEE:

The Managing Committee shall consist of: President, Ex-Officio, 12 Members duly elected and 3 Co-opted Members, making a total of 17.

WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO CONTEST FOR ELECTION:

- 1. A Member shall have no right to contest for any position unless member has paid the Annual subscription fees, for the current year.
- 2. Proprietor/Partner/Director/Manager or Principal Officer (Manager of Principal Officer shall be person who is holding valid general power of attorney to operate Bank Account of the Firm), whose name appears as an authorised Nominee of the Member-firm in the Register of the Association as on 31st March 2023 will be eligible to contest the election of the Managing Committee.
- 3. A Member who has completed at least 3 years as an elected Managing Committee Member, having worked as an Office Bearers for a minimum period of one year or Past President is eligible for Presidentship.
- 4. A Member who contests for the Presidentship is not entitled to contest for the Membership of the Managing Committee.
- 5. A Member contesting for Managing Committee seat should be a Member of the EMA for the minimum period of 2 years.
- 6. Members are requested to check their official address registered with EMA office. If address differ, member's form is liable to be rejected.

NOMINATION FORMS

Candidates standing for the election shall fill up their nomination forms on the prescribed forms duly signed by themselves and proposer and two seconders (Nominee of Member firms) and then put the said form in the Ballot Box kept at the Association's Office, Nomination forms completed in all respect are to be submitted to the Associations Office and put in the Ballot Box latest by **Tuesday, 7th June 2022 on or before 5.00 pm.** Incomplete form will be rejected.

WITHDRAWALS:

If any of the Contesting Candidate wishes to withdraw from the election, he shall inform the Hon. Secretary in writing on or before 12th June 2023 before 5:00 pm.

EXAMPLE OF AN AUTHORIZED NOMINEE:

Example of an Authorized Nominee for purpose of proposing and seconding is as follows: "Suppose a Member-Firm consists of Partners or Directors, viz. A.B.C. etc. and firm has nominated 'A' as their authorised nominee to represent their firm at the Association, the signature of 'A' only will be considered valid for the purpose of proposing or seconding. The signature of other Partners or Directors will not be valid for this purpose.

If Manager or the Principal Officer of the firm is appointed as the Authorised Nominee of the firm, his/her signature will be valid for the purpose of proposing or seconding".



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TECH KNOWLEDGE: FLAMEPROOF

What do you mean by flameproof?

The process of flame proofing involves reducing the amount of flammable material present in an object, or otherwise protecting it from fire. The goal is to reduce the risk of the object being damaged or destroyed by fire. This can be done by making the object fireproof, heat-resistant, or flame-resistant

What are flameproof equipment/flameproof products?

Flameproof equipment is designed to prevent the ignition of surrounding flammables in a hazardous area. This is done by ensuring that any internal ignition within the equipment will not be able to transmit outside of the protective enclosure.

Flame proofing is a preferred protection method when electrical equipment has highenergy arcing or sparking components that could potentially cause an explosion.



Flame proofing is a technique extensively used for light fittings, junction boxes, and motors in hazardous areas. The IEC certifies protective equipment and the local IS (Intrinsically Safe) standards govern usage. This method is highly effective in preventing explosions.

What are flameproof electrical fittings?

Flameproof equipment is designed to prevent the ignition of surrounding flammables in a hazardous area. Basically, it helps to protect people and property from fire by containing it within the equipment.



What is Flameproof Certification?

The certification process for explosion or flameproof protection requires that the enclosure be strong enough to contain an explosive reaction. Additionally, the certified protection must withstand the internal pressures generated without fracturing or distorting to prevent propagation. Products are put through rigorous testing for flame and explosion protection, including several actual explosions within simulated environments, in order to become officially certified.

The terms 'explosion-proof' and 'flameproof' are two sides of the same coin. They both refer to electrical equipment that is designed for use in hazardous areas. The main difference between the two is that explosion-proof equipment is designed to contain an explosion within the device, while flameproof equipment is designed to prevent an explosion from happening in the first place.

Where to use flameproof products?

Flameproof explosion proof luminaires & panel & junction box ,motors etc find their application in Warehouses, Pharma, Chemical, Fertilizer, Petrochemical facilities, Manufacturing sites, Pulp & Paper mills, underground tunnels and also water treatment and sewage facilities, among other uses. They are used as they provideprotection against dirt, water and moisture, while also offering resistance to corrosion.



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IMPORTANT NEWS

MINISTRY OF FINANCE

The gross GST revenue collected in the month of March 2023 is 1,60,122 crore of which CGST is 29,546 crore, SGST is 37,314 crore, IGST is 82,907 crore (including 42,503 crore collected on import of goods) and cess is 10,355 crore (including 960 crore collected on import of goods). It is for the fourth time, in the current financial year that the gross GST collection has crossed 1.5 lakh crore mark registering second highest collection since implementation of GST. This month witnessed the highest IGST collection ever.

The government has settled ₹33,408 crore to CGST and ₹28,187 crore to SGST from IGST as regular settlement. The total revenue of Centre and the States in the month of March 2023 after IGST settlement is ₹62,954 crore for CGST and ₹65,501 crore for the SGST.

The revenues for the month of March 2023 are 13% higher than the GST revenues in the same month last year. During the month, revenues from import of goods was 8% higher and the revenues from domestic transaction (including import of services) are 14% higher than the revenues from these sources during the same month last year. The return filing during March 2023 has been highest ever. 93.2% of statement of invoices (in GSTR-1) and 91.4% of returns (in GSTR-3B) of February were filed till March 2023 as compared to 83.1% and 84.7%, respectively same month last year.


The total gross collection for 2022-23 stands at ₹18.10 lakh crore and the average gross monthly collection for the full year is ₹1.51 lakh crore. The gross revenues in 2022-23 were 22% higher than that last year. The average monthly gross GST collection for the last quarter of the FY 2022-23 has been ₹1.55 lakh crore against the average monthly collection of ₹1.51 lakh crore, ₹1.46 lakh crore and ₹1.49 lakh crore in the first, second and third quarters respectively.

The chart below shows trends in monthly gross GST revenues during the current year. The table shows the state-wise figures of GST collected in each State during the month of March 2023 as compared to March 2022.

IMPORTANT NEWS

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE MAHARASHTRA STATE BUDGET SPEECH DATED 9TH MARCH, 2023

A. AMNESTY SCHEME, 2023 FOR GST DEPT (FOR PRE-GST LAWS):

- 1. Complete waiver of the arrears in cases where arrears are Rs. 2,00,000/- or less per year.
- 2. Dealers having arrears up to Rs. 50 lakhs or less per statutory order will pay only 20% amount and balance 80% will be waived.

B. PROFESSIONAL TAX

- 1. Female employees drawing monthly salary up to 25000/- will be exempted from Profession Tax.
- 2. The definition of 'Person with Disability' in the Profession Tax Act is proposed to be amended.

C. VAT RATE CHANGES

Reduction of VAT rate on ATF from 25% to 18% in Mumbai, Pune and Raigad districts.

D. BENEFITS TO THE FARMERS

- 1. Farmers to get Rs 12,000 honorarium per year.
- 2. Only INR 1/- would be required to pay for Peek Vima instead of existing 2% of the premium amount.
- 3. Free accommodation, lunch and other related facilities provided at Krushi markets.
- 4. E-punchanama through mobiles, Drones etc. can be done.

E. HEALTH INSURANCE COVERAGE

The coverage of the Mahatma Phule Jan Arogya scheme, a health insurance scheme of the government, has been raised from Rs 1.5 lakh to Rs 5 lakh.

F. STUDENTS SCHOLARSHIP

Rs 1,000 to Rs 5,000 for students of Class 5 to Class 7 Rs 1,500 to Rs 7,500 for students of Class 8 to Class 10 Uniforms will be provided free of charge to students of all categories up to Class 8 in local body and government schools.

G. UNORGANISED WORKERS

Social security benefits and welfare schemes will be provided. Maharashtra State Auto Rickshaw Taxi Driver-Owner Welfare Corporation will be established.

H. GEMS AND JEWELLERY

State government will soon announce new gems and jewellery policy. State to set up plan in Navi Mumbai.

I. RATION KIT BENEFITS TO POOR CITIZENS

Poor citizens to be provided with Anand Shida (free ration kit) on the occasion of Gudi Padwa and Dr Bhimrao Ambedkar's birth anniversary.

J. FINANCIAL AID FOR GIRL CHILD - INR 1,00,000/-

Families having yellow and orange ration cards to get Rs 5,000 after birth of child, Rs 4,000 after Class 4, Rs 6,000 after Class 6 and Rs 8,000 after Class 11. Rs 75,000 will be given to the beneficiary girl after she attains the age of 18 years.

K. BENEFITS FOR WOMEN'S

- 1. Women to get 50% discount in state transport buses.
- 2. 1% discount on stamp duty.
- 3. Shakti Sadan', a new scheme to provide shelter to women in distress, liberated from sexual exploitation or facing domestic violence.

700 Apla Dawakhana dispensaries will be started in the entire state in the name of late Balasaheb Thackeray.


PPI MERCHANT TRANSACTIONS OF OVER ₹2,000 TO ATTRACT 1.1% CHARGE FROM APRIL 1

There will be no charge to customers and for normal bank account to bank account UPI payments: NPCI

Starting April 1, merchant transactions exceeding ₹2,000 in value done using Prepaid Payment Instruments (PPI Wallets) on UPI will attract an interchange charge of 1.1%. However, "the new interchange charges are only applicable for the PPI merchant transactions and there is no charge to customers," the National Payments Corporation of India (NPCI), which governs UPI, said in a statement on Wednesday.

"It is further clarified that there are no charges for the bank account to bank account based UPI payments (i.e. normal UPI payments)," the NPCI added.


In the statement, NCPI said as per recent regulatory guidelines, the PPI Wallets had been permitted to be part of the interoperable UPI ecosystem.

- 1.The Government vide Notification No. 14/2022 Central Tax dated 05th July, 2022 has notified few changes in Table 4 of Form GSTR-3B for enabling taxpayers to report correct information regarding ITC availed, ITC reversal and ineligible ITC in Table 4 of GSTR-3B. According to the changes, the net ITC is to be reported in Table 4(A) and ITC reversal, if any, is to be reported in Table 4(B) of GSTR-3B.
- 2.Currently in GSTR-3B, credit note (CN) is being auto-populated in Table 4B(2), as ITC reversal. Now in view of the said changes, the impact of credit notes are also to be accounted on net off basis in Table 4(A) of GSTR-3B only. Accordingly following changes have been made in the GST Portal from January-2023 period onwards and shall be applicable from tax period January 2023' onwards.
 - a. The impact of credit note & their amendments will now be auto-populated in Table 4(A) instead of Table 4(B) of GSTR-3B. In case the value of credit notes becomes higher than sum of invoices and debit notes put together, then the net ITC would become negative and the taxpayers will be allowed to report negative values in Table-4A. Also, taxpayers can now enter negative values in Table 4D(2) of GSTR-3B.
 - b. Consequent updates/ modification in the advisory, messages, instructions, and help-text in form GSTR-2B, without any structural changes in form GSTR-2B summary or tables have also been done in GSTR-2B.
 - c. The calculation logic of Comparison Report has now been changed accordingly.
- 3.The taxpayers are advised to go through instructions/help text carefully in GSTR-2B & System Generated GSTR-3B pdf before filing GSTR-3B.


